The Learning Never Stops... Even for Our Staff

It has been a busy year of professional development at Cocalico School District! First, teachers had the opportunity to participate in Eastern Mennonite University's Foundations of Literacy course onsite at Cocalico. This eight-week class provides K-8 educators with new tools they can use in the classroom setting. The goal of the program is to educate participants on the science of reading as well as other foundational strategies of literacy.

In addition to this opportunity, teachers at Cocalico School District were invited to take part in the Rotational Learning program. Teachers attended classes at Lancaster-Lebanon IU13 where they learned about utilizing station rotations in order to meet the specific needs of today's learners. Participating teachers received personalized coaching and attended collaboration sessions throughout the year.

Other topics that were the focus of scheduled teacher in-service days included addressing barriers to learning, strategies and accommodations for gifted learners, and grade-level collaboration. In addition, mandated trainings such as Act 55 Trauma Informed Practices, Act 71 Suicide Prevention Training, and Act 126 Child Abuse Training and Educator Discipline Act were offered to maintain staff compliancy.


Recognition for Outstanding Service to the Community

A Fresh Take on Learning

As the weather begins to get warmer, the Construction Technology class at Cocalico High School will be hard at work on a new outdoor instructional area. Preparations will soon begin on the paver patio, bench, and picnic tables that will be constructed near the southwest side of the building. This project is being funded by a grant from the Cocalico Education Foundation.

In addition, the Construction Technology class is partnering with elementary students to give them a tour of the new outdoor space. After the tour, elementary students will get a chance to make their own construction projects to take home with them!

Under Construction

In November 2023, renovations began at Reamstown Elementary to address the age of building systems, improve energy efficiency and lighting, create a more secure entrance and enhanced office spaces, and transform the library into a more comprehensive instructional area. Lighting and paint in classrooms will be completed in phases. Each phase may take up to four weeks to complete, and during that time, classrooms will be relocated so instructional time is not affected.

The tentative timeline for completion of the renovations is as follows:

- New office area Summer 2024
- · New library December 2024
- Classroom lighting/paint March 2025
- Final completion of all mechanical/system upgrades Spring 2025

Tell us a little bit about yourself: I'm a mini sheepadoodle; my mom is an old English sheepdog, and my dad is a miniature poodle. I was born on October 29, 2023. I have 13 brothers and sisters, but I think I'm the cutest one in the family! I live with my human mommy, daddy, brother, and sister, and I get to go to work with mommy (Mrs. Beth Bonagura) every day.

Hobbies? I like to run and play with other dogs, especially Mr. D's dog, Kona. I like when the students read to me and rub my belly, and I'm really trying hard not to eat the books. I like learning new commands because it feels good to learn, and I get lots of treats as I practice.

What have you learned so far? I know the following commands: sit, down, come, wait, leave it, crate, and watch me. I'm learning how to walk on a leash without pulling, how to shake and drop, and general puppy manners such as not jumping on people, not eating anyone's homework, and not going potty inside the school or my house.

Favorite color? Hot pink! I love to nip at anything hot pink, especially my sister Janey's hot pink boots!

Favorite toys? Any stuffed animal, especially my hedgehog that squeaks.

Final thoughts? Learning how to be a service dog is hard work, and I will not have my official certification for a long time. I have a lot to learn over the next two years, but I am thankful that I have all my friends at CMS to help me. I hope someday I can have the same impact Digby (Mrs. Bonagura's first service dog who faithfully worked at Cocalico for nearly 14 years) had on Cocalico.

Mrs. Beth Bonagura, special education teacher at Cocalico Middle School, is Macy's owner and trainer. She explained Macy's two-year training process through UDS. Together, they will attend trainings every Monday evening. In addition, they will spend one Saturday per month training in public areas such as the mall, the airport, a sports arena, Hersheypark, and many other community sites. By the end of the training, Macy will have learned and mastered 80-100 commands. She will be able to help students pick up pencils when dropped, open doors, turn on lights, carry materials, etc. She will also aid students needing academic and/or emotional support. Macy will be there to be best friends to those who need it!

According to Mrs. Bonagura, "There are currently UDS dogs in 15 other school districts with another 20 districts/ private schools on waiting lists. Macy is a little unique in that she is 'owner trained.' Most of the dogs are trained and raised through UDS and then adopted at about 2 years old." Cocalico Middle School is thankful to have Mrs. Bonagura willing to take the time to train this very important member of the middle school staff! Welcome to Cocalico, Macy!

Planning for the Future at CSD

On Monday, February 26, 2024, the Cocalico Board of School Directors approved the 2024-2027 Comprehensive Plan for the district. The plan, first presented by Dr. Haldeman at the January Board meeting, was a result of numerous stakeholder meetings which began in July 2023 and included parents, business leaders, community members, administrators, and staff members. During the meetings, data was reviewed, district strengths and weaknesses were discussed, and areas for improvement were established.

The three goals of the 2024-2027 Comprehensive Plan are as follows:

Goal 1: English Language Arts (ELA)

By the end of the 2026-2027 school year, each level will have completed a comprehensive review of their ELA program and practices, and will have implemented evidence-based materials, strategies, core programs, and intervention models.

Goal 2: Growth of Subgroups

The Cocalico School District will see an increase of 6% in the performance level of the following subgroups on their ELA, math, and science scores, as evidenced by PSSA and Keystone Exams: Economically Disadvantaged, English Language Learners, and Students with Disabilities, as compared to their performances during the 2022-2023 school year.

Goal 3: Social-Emotional Learning

At each level, and at least one time each year, we will train our staff on research-based strategies to support social-emotional learning in the classroom and implement at least one way to positively influence our students and their mental health.

Action plans for successfully reaching the Comprehensive Plan goals are being developed and will be implemented throughout the next three years. Updates on the progress of the established goals will be provided in upcoming district publications. The plan will be available on the district website after it is approved by the Pennsylvania Department of Education.

Work Permits

Did you know that students between the ages of 14-17 must obtain a work permit prior to beginning employment? High school students may obtain their work permits at the Cocalico High School main office between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Cocalico High School students will take the application home to have his/her parent sign the document and then return it to the office. Upon return, the student will sign the work permit in the presence of an office staff member. Not a CHS student? Under the Child Labor Law, an application can be completed in a one-step process when a parent/legal guardian and minor appear together with proof of the minor's age. Acceptable documents include the minor's birth certificate, passport, learner's permit, driver's license, or other valid proof of age. Questions? Please call 717-336-1423. Middle school students can also obtain their work permits in the main office at Cocalico Middle School using the same process as outlined above.


